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From the Desk of the Coordinator

New Statutes and Election of Officials

The year 2003 saw the approval of the new Statutes and the election of the officials of the Anthropos Institute. In his letter of March 6, Fr. General Antonio Pernia announced that the General Council had approved the revised Statutes of the Anthropos Institute *ad experimentum* till March 6, 2007 and initiated the process of election of the new Coordinator of the Institute (CAI) and of the Coordinating Council (CC). In the letter of September 2, he announced the appointment of Fr. Ennio Mantovani as CAI and of Frs. Augustine Kanjamala and Jacek J. Pawlik as members of the CC.

With the election of the CC the new structure of the Anthropos Institute was ready to function. The most important changes in the new structure are:

1. a shift of focus and identity in the nature of the Institute from buildings in a fixed place to scholars working around the SVD world.
2. a leadership with responsibility conferred by the General for all the individual members and the linked institutes.
3. an option for modern communication technology in its administration,
 1. a. Anthropos Institute does not denote anymore a place with buildings and offices but all the members. The Institute can survive even if the various member institutes close down because of lack of funds or personnel.
 - b. The authority is not linked to a place but to members who can reside anywhere. Planning and coordination continues even if individual institutes and their buildings close.
 - c. The internationality of the leadership becomes more feasible.
2. The individual members and institutes, if need arises, have a person with the mandate to mediate and get officially involved. On the other hand, the Generalate has given an individual the responsibility to

see to it that the whole organisation, individuals and institutes, function well.

3. The way the Institute is administered is through various internet technologies. Dwindling funds will not make administration and communications impossible.

First Zonal Meeting of Anthropos Institute

The official launching of the new structure took place at the Zonal Meeting of the Anthropos Institute in Nysa, Poland, September 14 to 19. This meeting was the result of a previous request from the *ad hoc* committee. New and relevant about this meeting was its structure: the first part was dedicated to the dialogue with the leaders of the Society and the second was reserved to the members, to their work and their academic updating.

The Anthropos Institute is the expression of a specialised ministry of our Society – her first specialisation, as a matter of fact – and the Institute intends to keep and improve this role within the Society and her mission. This can be done only if the official dialogue with the Society is integrated into the structure of the Institute. The Anthropos Institute's zonal meetings should fulfil this function. The CAI invited Fr. General and, because the meeting was taking place in Europe, invited also the European Zonal Executive Committee: Frs. Fencz Anton, Jorge Fernandes, and Kruták Pavol, to present their expectations from the Institute in terms of service.

In the dialogue with the leaders of the Society two facts emerged: The Institute cannot continue to do research only in the Third World but must do research everywhere the Society is working, which means also in Europe. Secondly, the Institute, though anthropological, cannot work in isolation. While keeping its identity and specialisation must cooperate with other disciplines.

The second part of the meeting too, followed a different pattern. Instead of having members

presenting papers, the meeting had the members sharing their activities and plans and an invited professor led the group in a seminar. The purpose was for the members to know what the others were doing while exposing themselves to the criticism of the others and to have more time to deepen through input and group work a relevant issue in the field of anthropology.

Activities of the CC and the CAI

The Coordinating Council had the first meetings at Nysa, during the Anthropos Institute's Zonal Meeting. Discussed were mainly the procedures for its meetings, the needs in the publications department at St. Augustin and the possible candidates for the same, the membership of the Institute, and the relationship with other anthropological institutes within the Society.

The CAI, at the beginning of November, transferred his office to Melbourne, where he is lecturing at the Yarra Theological Union. In an age when more and more academic institutions make use of audio and video to communicate and to hold conferences, he sees one of his tasks to develop such a pattern of communication for the CC.

He has been identifying and contacting all the confreres studying social and religious sciences. Once the work is completed he will publish a list of these confreres. He has prepared a brochure on the Anthropos Institute which will be sent to all SVD formation houses to make the students aware of this specific ministry and of the concrete possibilities given within the Society. A new responsibility taken within the Australian Province will give him the chance to visit a few formation houses within Asia and to talk personally to the students about the Anthropos ministry. He will also have a chance to meet members and to visit their institutes.

Publications of the Institute

Members of the Institute publish in many journals and book series, some of which are organs of the institutes or institutions at which they work. The official journal of the Anthropos Institute, however, is *Anthropos*, and the book series are *Studia* and *Collectanea Instituti Anthropos*, which makes these publications our common concern.

Anthropos Institute Sankt Augustin is responsible for the official publications of our Institute. The editorial team of Othmar Gächter, Anton Quack, and Joachim Piepke has to be congratulated for the quality of its work.

Anthropos 98. 2003 counts 676 pages with 23 articles, 13 reports and comments, and 128 book reviews. Henryk Zimón contributed an article and Anton Quack the obituary for Johann Frick. Two AI-members, Pawlik and Quack, as well as two of our anthropology students, Ivan Lobo and Stanislaw Wargacki, contributed book reviews.

Besides the articles and book reviews appearing in *Anthropos*, the Zeitschriftenschau represents a great service for the readers who do not have direct access to big and specialised university libraries. It makes them aware of the latest articles in the various fields of socio-religious studies and linguistics.

No 27 of *Anthropology and Mission* appeared in July and brought 27 book and 7 article reviews and this in spite of the shortage of personnel. This publication is not only edited but also written by the editorial team: The book reviews by Gächter and Quack and the article reviews by Piepke.

The service Anthropos Institute Sankt Augustin offers to anyone asking for (free) copies of the articles one finds reviewed in *Anthropology & Mission* is to be commended.

S. Lourdusamy is the director of Sanskriti, Centre for Applied Cultural Research, Indore. He writes:

“I have published ten books. Two books containing Bible stories are ready to be published in Nimadi (widely spoken dialect). Besides my field-work that takes me at least once a week in any of the four directions, I held lectures in two seminaries, conducted eight seminars for the people with whom I work and five seminars for other organizations. In ten villages we held videos shows and photo exhibitions. These videos and photos were taken in the same villages for people to see and critically reflect over their own practices. Such discussions were held in four different dialects.”

Mantovani Ennio

Ennio Mantovani lectures at the Yarra Theological Union (Melbourne) on Culture, Mission, and Dialogue and at Good Shepherd College, Fatima (PNG) on Melanesian Cultures and Melanesian Religions.

He presented a paper at the academic staff meeting at Fatima: “Melanesian Evolution and Biblical Creation.” At the Zonal Meeting of Anthropos Institute at Nysa he delivered the paper: “Towards a New Vision for the Anthropos Institute.”

Pawlik Jan Jacek

Jacek Pawlik teaches Anthropology, Missiology and Science of Religion at the University of Warmia and Mazury in Olsztyn and Science of Religion and Applied Anthropology in the Divine Word Seminary in Pieniezno.

Anton Quack is the editor of the book reviews of *Anthropos*, co-editor of *Anthropology & Mission*, and Chair of Cultural Anthropology at the Faculty of St. Augustin.

Schroeder Roger

Roger Schroeder lectures at CTU, Chicago. In 2003 he took a sabbatical, the first part of which he used to finish a book he is writing with Stephen Bevans: *Constants in Context* and that will appear this year. From December 16, 2003, till about January 5, 2004, he researched in the library of the Anthropos Institute Sankt Augustin.

Zocca Franco

Franco Zocca is the director of the Melanesian Institute at Goroka, PNG, and is involved both in the ongoing formation of lay and religious and in the field research. He has been involved in the research of the Institute on "Modernization Processes and Religious Revival in Oceania" and in the preparation of the next field research on "Sorcery in PNG."

Institutes

So far there is only one member institute, Anthropos Institute Sankt Augustin, but there are several others founded and run or supported by Anthropos Institute members.

The Anthropos Institute St. Augustine

The main activity of Anthropos Institute Sankt Augustin is the editorial work for our official publications besides lecturing at the Hochschule, Sankt Augustin. His director, Piepkke, is also the rector of the Hochschule with all its administrative work and the lecturing as professor. The lack of personnel is a serious handicap for this member Institute. The efforts of the director, Piepkke, and of the CAI, Mantovani, so far did not bring more than promises for the future.

A great, though partial, help was the transfer of Fr. Franz Gessinger from Paris and his assignment in the Institute is to work in the special library project, computerising the index of the same.

Institute of Indian Culture

The Institute of Indian Culture has a new director in the person of Fr. Augustine Kanjamala. We congratulate

Kanjamala for the nomination and wish him God's blessing.

He submitted in December the application to the University of Mumbai for permanent recognition of the Institute of Indian Culture for conducting research and conferring degrees of M.A. & Ph.D. in the fields of Anthropology and Sociology. For the last seven years the Institute has been recognised for the above purpose on a probationary basis. We wish Kanjamala success in his efforts.

Melanesian Institute

The Institute continued in its involvement in the orientation of new missionaries and in the ongoing formation of the confreres and other church and social workers.

Philip Gibbs is the director of the field research which this time is done in cooperation with the Pacific Theological College, Suva, Fiji, and is directed by Dr. Manfred Ernst. The topic is "Modernization Processes and Religious Revival in Oceania." The field research in New Caledonia and Vanuatu is planned for February-March 2004. The next project will be on "Sorcery in PNG" but it is still at the stage of design and library research.

The Institute publishes the journal *Catalyst* and the book series *Point*.

Sanskriti. Centre for Applied Cultural Research

The Centre continues its research and documentation of the local cultures of the zone. The director Lourdasamy writes: "Till today we have 222 hours of video documentation, 201 hours of audio documentation and at least 1000 photos of cultural events in actual situations." Congratulations for this achievement.

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Tamale Institute for Cross-Cultural Studies

From the 5th to 7th December, 2003, the Tamale Institute for Cross-Cultural Studies held its 20th anniversary celebrations.

As an integral part of the 20th Anniversary Celebrations TICCS launched its two new MA programmes—the MA in Cross-Cultural Ministry (in affiliation with Akrofi-Christaller Memorial Centre, Akropong) and the MA in Cross-Cultural Development (in affiliation with the University for Development Studies, Tamale).
