From the desk of the coordinator

In the words of former Superior General Antonio Pernia, **Anthropos Institute (AI) should “act as the guardian of the Anthropos tradition of the Society”** (*VERBUM SVD* 45, 1 (2004), 34). This issue of *Interlink* presents the 2019 activities of AI individuals and ten institutions, dedicated to the social and religious sciences, within the global network of Anthropos Institute International (AII). These efforts contribute to academic scholarship and the continuation of the Anthropos tradition of the Arnoldus family.

The **Coordinating Council of Anthropos Institute International** consists of Roger Schroeder (USC) as Coordinator; and Stanislaus Grodz (GER) and Michael Sebastian Maria (INM) as members of the Council. They held meetings (via Skype) on January 26, 2019, and on February 10, 2020. The agenda of the latter meeting included: financial update on AI-Sankt Augustin, future personnel issues for the journal, update of the AI International website, the *Anthropology and Mission* publication, and the proposal for a common AI book publication on the occasion of the 90th anniversary of the Institute. The next Skype Council meeting is scheduled for May, 2020. Schroeder and Grodz also met in Poland in November 2019 (while both were speaking at the same conference) to discuss some AI business. Other committee business was conducted by email.

In terms of **AI membership**, there are now thirty-eight full members, two emeriti, and six associate members for a total of forty-six Anthropos Institute members, the same number as in 2018.

International Coordinator Schroeder was able to meet personally and/or collectively with the following AI members in Lublin, Poland in November 2019: Andrzej Bronk, Stanislaus Grodz, Zdzislaw Kupisinski, Jacek Pawlik, and Henryk Zimon. In February 2020, Schroeder met the following AI members in Sankt Augustin, Germany: Vinsensius Gunawan Adi, Othmar Gächter, Günther Gessinger, Grodz, Joachim Piepke, and Darilus Piwowarczyk.

A number of AI members continued in 2019 to be

involved in activities related to the interculturality themes and resolutions of the **2012 and 2018 SVD General Chapters**. This includes a joint three-week program (Spanish and English) on “Spirituality and Interculturality” in Steyl, the Netherlands, in January-February 2020. The SVD and SSpS General Councils reconstituted the **Resource Committee for Interculturality (RCI)** in 2019 with five SVD and five SSpS, including three AI members: S.M. Michael (INM), Roger Schroeder (USC), Janet Tellis (Indian in Paraguay). In 2019 AI and RCI members and other SVD and SSpS resource persons in interculturality greatly extended their work in intercultural living and mission to many **other men’s and women’s religious congregations** around the world.

Publications of the Institute

The official publications of the Institute are entrusted to the Editorial Board at Anthropos Institute St. Augustin. **The year 2019 was a very productive year with the publication of the journal, four monographs, *Anthropology and Mission*, and an Anthropos Special Issue.**

Staff

The **Editorial Board** at Anthropos Institut Sankt Augustin consists of: 5 SVDs (Darius Piwowarczyk – the Editor-in-Chief, Vincensius Adi Gunawan, Joachim Piepke, Othmar Gächter, Stanislaw Grodz) and 4 lay co-workers (Birgit Lenz-Volland – reviews, Andrea Mück-Sommershoff – administration, editorial support, Harald Grauer – librarian, editorial support, Qianheng Zhao – digitalisation; editorial support).

Publications

In 2019, NOMOS-Academia Verlag took over the full production process of the journal (typesetting in addition to printing and distribution). There were some typesetting problems with the journal's 1st issue. Most of them were solved after a meeting with the typesetter team on 22nd October 2019.

1. **Anthropos 2019** (vol. 114) – two issues of 697 pages – were published and sent out to subscribers (June and December). Vol. 114 contains 27 articles + 5 others grouped in a **new section** ('Debate': Mission history and postcolonial museums), 2 obituaries and 118 book reviews. The section of Zeitschriftenschau offers an overview of contents of some 140 journals specialized in the field of social and religious studies.

Six SVDs contributed to the contents of the journal: Paulus Budi Kleden, Karl Heinz Arenz, Vincensius Adi Gunawan, Othmar Gächter, Stanislaw Grodz and Darius J. Piwowarczyk.

Joachim Andrade

Andrade published several articles as well as released two books, one on Mission and the other on Inter religious Dialogue.

Teaching

1. In the Claretian Faculty – STUDIUM THEOLOGICUM, he taught Sociology of Religion, Ecumenism and Inter-Religious Dialogue and Missiology, over two semesters.
2. In the Faculty of Vincentians Fathers he taught Theological anthropology, Comparative study of religions and Ecumenism.
3. In the Pontifical Catholic University of Paraná, as the professor of the department of Theology and Philosophy, he taught graduate and post-graduate students.
4. He taught courses on Interculturality and mission, Mission spirituality, and Intercultural formation in different parts of Brazil. Some Congregations too have requested the theme on Interculturality for their ongoing formation.
5. For the month of July, at the invitation of the Bishops he taught graduate students in Dili, East Timor.
6. He gave lectures on Religion at St. Aloysius College, Mangalore, India.
7. Lectures on Interculturality in Philadelphia, US, for the Bernardine Sisters, and for the Franciscan Bernardine Sisters in Viamão, Porto Alegre.
8. Talk of Religion and human rights in St. Agnes College, Mangalore India.
9. He continues every year to teach missiology, interculturality and inter-religious dialogue, as preparation for the Brazilian missionaries of different congregations who have received the ad gentes mission assignment. This is organized by the Bishops Conference of Brazil.
10. He also teaches a course on interculturality and inculturation to the incoming missionaries to Brazil of various congregations.

Carl Milos Bulilan

Bulilan is the Vice President for Academic Affairs in the SVD Holy Name University in the province of Bohol, the Philippines. He taught Qualitative Research Methods and Urban and Rural Development..

In 2019, he taught Anthropology of Religion and Topics of Missiology (reading and discussing the Brazilian edition of "Prophetic Dialogue – Reflections on Christian Mission Today") at the graduate level at the Faculdade Católica in Porto Velho and gave a retreat about Mission as Prophetic Dialogue to seminarists of the Interdiocesan Seminary of Porto Velho. He is a member of the research group REPAL (Religião e periferia na América Latina – Religion and periphery in Latin America) at the Methodist University of São Paulo (UMESP). Patrick Gesch

Gesch is Professor at Divine Word University (DWU) in Madang, Papua New Guinea.

Professional Activities:

The dominant topic in Papua New Guinea for 2019 was the Referendum Vote concerning the independence of Bougainville. The result of the voting was an overwhelming vote of 98% for Independence.

The National Research Institute in Port Moresby had charge of academic preparation for the Referendum, as part of the general information campaign throughout the country and the Autonomous Region of Bougainville (AROB). They produced a well orchestrated set of papers by international experts and of bulletins for letting people know what was going to happen. One of their moves was to ask for academic contributions from other bodies in PNG. Gesch's Department at Divine Word University in Madang, of PNG Studies and International Relations, decided that as a group they had considerable experience with election monitoring and with Bougainville, and they could together produce a paper. They took the topic: Voting behaviour in the upcoming Referendum. They took the paper to a conference in Port Moresby and have had it published as a bulletin. Gesch did the main editorial work.

It helps us appreciate the need to learn in depth the language of the people, and to recognize that most communication is more non-verbal than verbal.”

Reports of Corporate Members

Anthropos Institute Sankt Augustin

Anthropos Institute member Stanislaw Grodz is the Director of Anthropos Institut, Sankt Augustin, and the following AI members also work there: Vincensius Adi Gunawan, Othmar Gächter, Günther

Gessinger, Joachim Piepke, and Dariusz Piwowarczyk. The extensive list of publications is described above (p. 2) under “Publications of the Institute.” The activities undertaken by individual AI members are listed in their personal reports.

1. Years ago the Institute started a **benefactors-sponsored project of gift-subscriptions of the journal**. Thanks to these specific donations we have been able to send the journal to some interested academic institutions worldwide that could not afford the subscription. However, the number of donors is declining. In 2019 only 12 gift-subscriptions were possible (apart from the gratis issues sent out from the Institute).

2. A number of **scholars** from various countries **visited the Institute**. Some used its library and archive facilities for research. The special interest in Gusinde’s materials continues.

* Prof. Alejandra Regúnaga (La Pampa University, Argentina) continued her linguistic research on the Yagan, Haus und Selk’nam languages from the *Gusinde Archives* for several months.

* Jan Hasselberg, a Norwegian free-lance photographer and scholar contacted us over his project of “repatriation of photos” to PNG.

* Jean-Hugo Ihl, a history student from *Heidelberg Universität*, consulted material from *Gusinde Archives*.

* A number of requests were received to authorise public use of Gusinde’s photos (from Latin America, France and the US). All of them were redirected to *Éditions Xavier Barral* that still manages the matter for a next couple of years.

3. The website

The updating of the Anthropos Institute International (AII) Webpage had only a very limited success. Only a few AII members responded to the invitation to have their academic profile presented on the Anthropos Webpage. The “Heritage” section still offers rich possibilities of cooperation /contribution (**the members are welcome to send in material about the earlier work of the Institute and its departed members**).

NOTE OF CLARIFICATION:

At the moment the official Statutes of Anthropos Institute recognize only full corporate association. However, we also acknowledge and include here the important efforts in 2016 of the following institutions dedicated to the study of culture and religion which carry out the Anthropos tradition of our Society, even though they are not full corporate members as of yet. Each of these institutes have some SVD affiliation, though several are presently not officially recognized by the SVD Generalate. One or more SVD are working in each of these centers, of whom many are currently members of Anthropos Institute.

Aditya Wacana Centre

Missiologist Raymundus Sudhiarsa, SVD, is the Director of Aditya Wacana Centre for Studies of Religion and Culture in Malang, Indonesia (IDJ),

and also rector of the 'Surya Wacana' SVD Major Seminary located just across the Centre. Other members of the Centre include Peter Bruno Sarbini (Islamologist) and Venantius Supriyono (Master in Sacra Scriptura). Associate members are Kristo Bala, Markus Situmorang, and Donatus Sermada. All members of the Centre are lecturers in the 'Widya Sasana' School of Philosophy and Theology, Malang, East Java. Besides their teaching, they also participate in the publication of the Institute's journal, *Perspektif* (published twice a year, in June and December).

Particular activities of the Staff

Sermada spent a semester leave in Sankt Augustin, Germany, during the second half of the year 2019. Sudhiarsa conducted to sets of workshops on Maximum Illud in Malaysia, and he participated in a Mission Congress on the occasion of Celebrating the Centenary of Maximum Illud in Jakarta. As a participant in the International Joint Conference on 'Doing Theology in Contemporary Indonesia: Interdisciplinary Perspectives' held at the School of Theology, Sanata Dharma University, Yogyakarta, Sudhiarsa gave a response to the Keynote Address of Felix Wilfred, who presented a paper entitled 'Asian Theological Ferment'. Throughout 2019, in collaboration with two colleagues from the 'Widya Karya' Catholic University, Malang, namely Diah Imaningrum Susanti and Rini Susrijani, Sudhiarsa has been completing a field research on 'Ekspresi Budaya Tradisional dan Hak Kekayaan Intelektual' (Expression of Traditional Culture and Intellectual Property Right). The finding of the research should be published by January 2020.

Anthropos do Brasil

Anthropos Institute member Djalma Antônio da Silva is the Director/President of Anthropos do Brasil. In 2019, members of the Institute met twice to develop a formation project for SVD new missionaries from Brazil Sub-zone. The project was prepared by the team at the Anthropos Assembly that took place on October 26th in Laranjeiras, Rio de Janeiro and was presented to the Provincials and Regional at the Assembly of the Brazil Sub-Zone in Sao Paulo on November 20th.

Institute of Indian Culture

AI member S.M. Michael is the Director of the Institute of India Culture in Mumbai, India. AI member M.T. Joseph is also works here. The Institute of Indian Culture (IIC) has been updating itself by digitalizing some of the rare and important books. The Archive Department of the Government of India has been financing part of this project.

Collaboration and programming

Institute's collaboration with other academic institutions in Mumbai continues. Academic staff of the Institute are involved in animation programmes and regular lectures in several colleges and seminaries in the country. IIC organized several Intercultural workshops for teachers and for the general public. The Institute has also entered into an MOU with the SNDT Women's University, Churchgate, Mumbai for undertaking joint research projects. The Institute is also collaborating with the

Bombay Archdiocesan Commission for Inter-Religious Dialogue. It organizes a One Year Diploma Course on "Basics in Inter-Religious Dialogue" for the teachers and Lay Catholics.

Publication

The Institute published the January and June 2019 issue of *Institute of Indian Culture News and Views* (Vol. 69, no. 1 & 2).

The Melanesian Institute (MI) is an Ecumenical social and Educational Institute administered by PNG and SI mainline churches (Catholic, Evangelical Lutheran, United and Anglican), that serves the people of Melanesia through Research, Publication and Education.

Nanzan Anthropological Institute

Prof. Goto Akira, who was trained in Ethno-Archeology at Hawai'i University, is the Director of the **Nanzan Anthropological Institute, which celebrated its 70th anniversary (1949-2019)**. The journal *Asian Ethnology* (AE) is now being published under the Nanzan Anthropological Institute. Sanskriti -- North Eastern Institute of Cultural Research

AI member Jose Kuzhikkattuthazhe is the Director of Sanskriti—North Eastern Institute of Cultural Research (NEICR) in Guwahati, India (ING). The Assistant Director, Fr. Manoj Antony SVD has submitted his doctoral thesis and is waiting for his defense in the early part of 2020.

Publications and networking

In 2019, the Institute made important contacts with a few more institutions of higher learning. This has opened up vistas for collaborating seminars and edited volumes of national importance. Two books have been published based on previous seminars.

Syncretism in India: Cultural and Religious Perspectives, and *Customary Law as Discourse: NE in Context..* Membrs of the Institute, in collaboration with various universities and select scholars, are in the process of preparing a number of contemporary volumes pertaining to the nation and NE India.

The Institute is committed to attending conferences in other SVD research institutes when possible. As a long standing desire and plan, it is in the process of networking with various anthropological research institutions owned and managed by SVD in India.

Conferences

In 2019 Sanskriti-North Eastern Institute of Cultural Research, Guwahati organized the 13th consecutive annual national conference. The 14th annual conference was held on January 21-22, 2020, on "Inter-Community Linkages: Socio Cultural Milieu of Manipur," at the Pastoral Centre in Imphal, Manipur. About 30 professors and scholars are expected to present data based papers with special

reference to the state of Manipur which had seen unrest and even violence for a long period of thirty years and more.

Sanskriti – Institute of Dravidian Culture and Research

Anthropos Institute member Lazar Gnanaprakasam is the Director of *Sanskriti* – Institute of Dravidian Culture and Research (IDCR) in Hyderabad, India.

1. On February 1-2, 2019, the Institute conducted its 6th National Seminar on, "Women among the Marginalized Communities of India: Issues and Challenges" Over 300 members participated and 30 papers were presented. The 6th book (350 pages), and the 5th Journal were released by the prominent anthropologists of the State.

2. On March 2-3, 2019 the Institute also conducted a Workshop for the "Plight of Unorganized Migrant Workers - A Sociological Study" This was in collaboration with the Catholic Bishops Conference of India (CBCI). This report is with the Ministry of Labour for further verification.

3. The 7th annual conference was held on January 31 and February 1, 2020.

Sanskriti Kendra – Tribal Cultural and Research Centre

Anthropos Institute member Ignatius Soreng is Director of Sanskriti Kendra, Panaspara, Sundargarh, India.. The rest of the staff consists of Andreas Kerketta SVD (Assistant Director cum Treasurer) and two Assistants—Valentine Soreng and Amar Raj Burh.

Programs:

1. Raising Tribal Writers' Program

This new venture aimed to raise writers from among the tribal youth and students. Since tribal people do not normally express themselves for the open society to know and observe them, the effort was to initiate the habit of writing among them and create a platform where they can find assistance for their expression. After months, 300 poems written by tribal people were gathered, from which 140 were selected and printed as a book titled *The First Step*. Poems were written in nine languages. The book was released at the well-attended tribal literary festival in January 2019.

2. Indigenous People's day and Anniversaries of Tribal Heroes was hosted by Sanskriti Kendra. These four celebrations are yearly programs that attract very good response.

3. The Light House Conference, which was held on 20th October, 2019, brought together 18 lecturers, Professors, and Researchers to discuss six research papers.

4. Tribal Cultural Dance Festival in 2019 had thirteen kisan teams participating, including one from a neighboring state. Dances were well documented for reference.

5. Tribal Research on Kisan Tribe

From the 62 tribal groups in the State of Odisha. Sanskriti Kendra focused its research in 2019 on the Kisan tribe.

Tamale Institute of Cross-Cultural Studies

The new Director of the Tamale Institute of Cross-

Cultural Studies (TICCS) in Ghana is Phaniel Myers Agudu, SVD. The senior staff of the Institute are Agudu, Director; Dr. Dominic Amonzem, Administrator; Br. Bruno Yirzie, SVD, Procurator/Guest House Manager. Resource persons from the University for Development Studies (UDS), St. Victor's Major Seminary and other Institutions regularly support TICCS in carrying out its various programmes.

Programmes:

1. TICCS ran cross-cultural orientation courses for various groups of people. Basically, two types of programmes, in terms of duration, were organized during the year: a two-week and a four-week residential programmes. These cross-cultural orientation courses were geared toward preparing new missionaries, seminarians and development personnel for effective crosscultural immersion and pastoral ministry in various cultures of Ghana. Our programmes also helped in preparing some of the people going on mission outside of Ghana.

2. They also introduced the following new courses: Basic Accounting principles; project writing with local/indigenous knowledge as the basis; Safeguarding Policies for Children and Vulnerable Adults; Inculturation and African liturgy; Liturgy and Para-liturgical celebrations; Contemporary issues in Catholic Marriage in Ghana; Culture and Pentecostalism; and Contemporary Mission Approaches.

3. TICCS also hosted other partner institutions in Ghana and abroad by making available its facilities and grounds for their exchange programmes.

4. In January, two staff members from Fu Jen University, Taiwan, Atillio Rossi, SVD and Felliza SSpS, visited TICCS on a feasibility tour for a possible future collaboration between **Fu Jen University, Taiwan** and TICCS. As a result, in June a team of nine (9) students and five (5) Professors from Fu Jen University visited TICCS for a two-week cultural exchange programme.

Research

1. A team of researchers from Savannah State University, Georgia, USA visited TICCS to hold discussions with the staff over possible academic research collaboration between the two institutions.

2. Agudu and Dr. Amonzem also made some field trips to Sirigu, in the Kasena-Nankana East District of the Upper East Region, as part of their ethnographic research in view of publishing an article on "Spirit Child Phenomenon."
